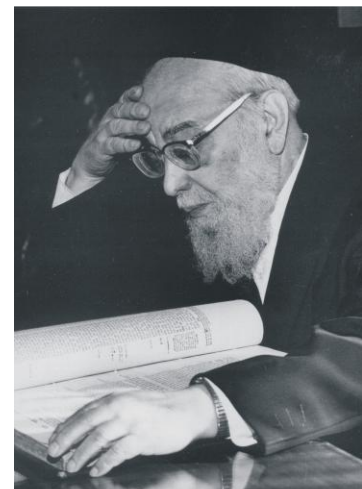
OVERVIEW

The Ner Israel Rabbinical College was founded in Baltimore in 1933, and received its charter under the laws of the State of Maryland on August 31, 1934. The fundamental aim of Ner Israel Rabbinical College is to teach young men the skills required for in-depth study of the Talmud, which is the source of the Halacha (legal framework of Judaism). The Talmud also provides the moral, philosophical and theological underpinnings of the Jewish religion. Knowledge of the Talmud, therefore, is the sine qua non for the understanding and transmission of authentic Judaism.

The historical role of a rabbinical college (Yeshiva) has always been to produce scholars able to master the teachings of our people and qualified to pass their learning on to the next generation. It must also produce men capable of deciding questions in both Torah Law and philosophy. Such men must have deep familiarity with all facets of Torah and be immersed in the historical traditions of how to apply the principles and rules of the Torah to situations that arise out of ever-changing circumstances and developing technologies. The role of the Yeshiva has come to include a broader goal of educating and producing knowledgeable professionals to be able to take leadership roles in their communities.

These formidable tasks can only be accomplished by having the primary focus of Ner Israel geared to the teaching of skills needed to develop a clear understanding of the fundamental concepts and system of logic of the Talmud.

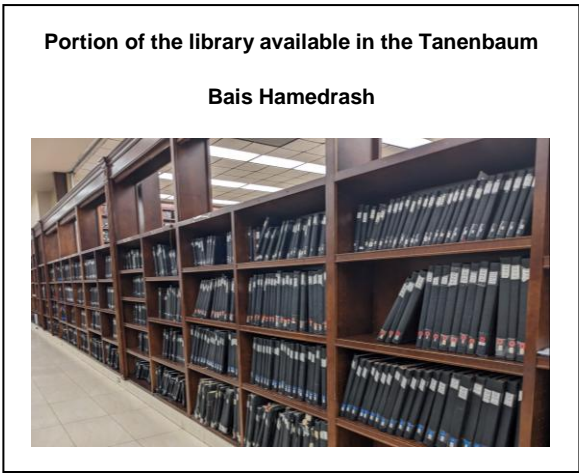
This sense of responsibility is emphasized both in our formal teaching and in Ner Israel's activities. Our students are fully aware of the personal involvement of our faculty and staff in communal issues of both global concern and local impact.

Ner Israel works with numerous fine secular educational institutions in the Baltimore metropolitan area to offer students the opportunity to attend undergraduate and graduate courses at the evening sessions of these universities.

THE CAMPUS

Ner Israel is fortunate to be situated on the ninety-acre Beren campus in the sprawling hills of suburban Baltimore. It is a unique community that allows our students to live and function in close proximity to their teachers. The students know that they can avail themselves of the personal interest and counsel of their mentors whenever needed. They are also privileged to observe beautifully flourishing families that are role models for them to emulate.

The focal point of the campus is the Tanenbaum Bais Hamedrash (study center). Completed in 1980, the structure is a combination study hall and library. The Israel Henry Beren Learning Center affords us additional classroom and library space to accommodate the growth of both our student body and our library collection. A substantial portion of the library collection, which in total contains over 45,000 volumes encompassing the breadth of Torah commentaries and Talmudic research, is shelved in the Bais Hamedrash, with the balance of the collection housed in the Learning Center. The library's open stacks and lengthy hours afford our students easy access to core works written by Jewish scholars throughout the ages. Many major volumes of responsa, in addition to more current publications in Talmudic research, are at the researcher's fingertips.



The Beren Learning Center also contains a separate audio library. It houses a vast collection of recorded lectures given in Ner Israel by members of our faculty and lectures delivered by other contemporary scholars during the past thirty years. Well over eight thousand audio files are listed in the catalog. The archive of cassette tapes, dating back decades, have been digitized and are now available online.

Other buildings on campus include the Rosenberg Dining Facility. Renovated and expanded in 2020, the dining room contains both the Sindler and Wole Dining Halls, with capacity to serve over 2500 meals per day. There is also the Ateres Leah Simcha Hall, used for public relations and fund-raising affairs. The Harry Beren Administration Building, houses Ner Israel's administrative offices.

In addition, there is the Hurwitz Educational Building, which contains two additional study halls, classrooms and lecture halls equipped with audiovisual facilities. There are three dormitories, which provide spacious housing for the students. The lower level of the Kolker Dormitory is furnished with a canteen, laundry, and dry-cleaning facilities. Athletic fields and basketball courts afford our students recreational facilities. Every effort is made to accommodate any handicap student who is



admitted to the institution. Therefore, we have upgraded or built most of the building on campus to be handicap accessible.

On campus faculty housing allows our faculty, and many married students, to reside on campus. They are housed in a neighborhood that includes eight three-story apartment buildings, each containing 12 units, and 18 six-bedroom townhouses.

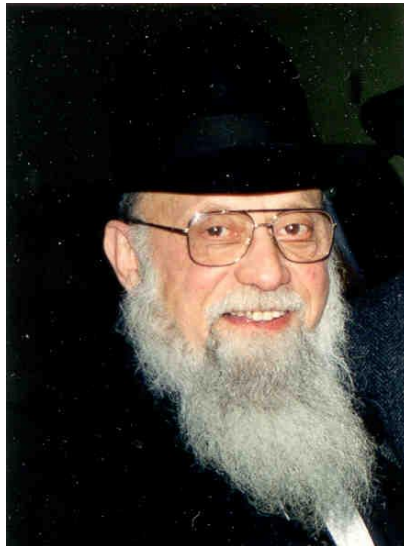

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

Students applying to Ner Israel Rabbinical College must be high school graduates or meet one of the recognized equivalents. Recognized equivalents include:

- GED/TASC/HiSET
- Successful completion of an associate's degree program
- Successful completion of at least 60 semester or trimester credit hours or 72 quarter credit hours that does not result in the awarding of an associate's degree, but that is acceptable for full credit toward a bachelor's degree at any institution
- Enrollment in a bachelor's degree program where at least 60 semester or trimester credit hours or 72 quarter credit hours have been successfully completed, including credit hours transferred into the bachelor's degree program.

In addition, they should have adequate preparation in Talmudic and related studies. The following are the minimum requirements:

Talmud: The ability to independently comprehend basic Talmudic text and the completion of 50 folios of Talmud with the commentary of Rashi.

Bible: A thorough knowledge of the Pentateuch and substantial parts of the Prophets and Hagiographa.

Language: The ability to read and write classical Hebrew; a working knowledge of the Aramaic language of the Talmud.

All applicants for admission are required to report for a personal interview and evaluation at Ner Israel, as personality and character are important factors in determining the eligibility of the prospective student.

IMMUNIZATIONS

As per Maryland State law, an individual enrolled in an institute of higher education and residing in on-campus student housing shall be vaccinated against meningococcal disease. A student is exempt from the above vaccination requirement if:

(i) The institution of higher education provides detailed information on the risks associated with meningococcal disease and the availability and effectiveness of any vaccine to the individual - if he is 18 or older, or his parent or guardian, if he is a minor.

(ii) The individual – if he is 18 or older, or his parent or guardian, if he is a minor, signs a written waiver in a form approved by the Secretary stating that the individual has received and reviewed the information provided and has chosen not to be vaccinated against meningococcal disease.

Detailed information regarding meningococcal disease, the availability and effectiveness of any vaccine, as well as an approved waiver are available in the administration building during regular business hours.

FINANCIAL AID

Both students and their parents are expected to participate to the best of their ability in financing their education. However, Ner Israel believes that qualified applicants should not be denied the opportunity to attend Ner Israel because of limited financial resources. Ner Israel, therefore, maintains a financial aid office to assist eligible students to the maximum extent within the limits of the resources available. Any student who is unable to pay full tuition may discuss his situation with the Financial Aid Administrator. The student is encouraged to file the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid), and the institution's Application for Financial Assistance. These forms are available from the Financial Aid Office. Institutional scholarships are available for students with financial needs. The Financial Aid Office staff can help students and parents fill out the forms correctly, thus avoiding delays in the processing of the forms. Students are encouraged to take advantage of this service, during regular office hours. The office is located in room 76 of the administration building. The current Director of Compliance and Financial Aid is Shmuel (Steven) Schachter and he can be reached at 443-548-6055 or at finaid@nirc.edu.

An applicant for financial aid from Ner Israel will be apprised of the cost of attendance, all available sources of financial aid, and all other aspects of the financial aid package awarded, including disbursement of the aid. In addition, he will be apprised of the academic criteria of the Yeshiva and will be able to personally meet with the financial aid officer who has determined his need.

The student's responsibilities include applying for aid before the deadline, maintaining satisfactory academic progress, and reporting all outside awards and any change in family or student financial status to the Financial Aid Office.

Eligibility for Federal Financial Aid is determined by a process called packaging. The student's Student Aid Index (SAI, determined by the Federal Processor) is subtracted from the student's total budget, and the student's need is determined. This concept of "need" is the foundation of financial aid. Students exhibiting need and who apply on time will have priority consideration for all aid programs.

The Student Aid Index consists of the parental contribution plus the student contribution. The parental contribution is the amount that the parents are expected to pay, based on their income and available assets. Allowances are made for expenses such as support of the family according to its size, and the number of children in college. Under extraordinary circumstances, allowances can be made for documented expenses such as elementary and high school tuition paid, and medical bills.

We expect the student to contribute toward his education using his prior year and summer earnings, if applicable. The student's assets are generally considered to be available for his education and are expected to be divided among his years of post-secondary education.

Various federal financial aid programs are available to eligible students at Ner Israel. These are described in detail under the next heading, "Federal Student Aid Programs."

FEDERAL STUDENT AID PROGRAMS

All students wishing to apply for any form of federal aid must complete the FAFSA, and submit it by June 30th at the end of the school year. For dependent students, the applicant and his parents must provide information. Independent students do not need parental information.

Note: While we believe the following information is accurate as of the date of publication, please keep in mind that federal regulations are constantly changing. Please contact the Financial Aid Office for the latest information.

The **Federal Pell Grant Program** provides undergraduates with outright grants that do not need to be repaid. Eligibility, as determined by the processing of the FAFSA, will be reported to the student in an SAR (Student Aid Report). Current grants range between \$767 and \$7,395.

The **Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG)** Program is a federal need-based grant program that supplements the Pell Grant. Money is allocated based on school selected criteria. For the current school year, awards are based on SAI. In order to be considered for the FSEOG, the application should be processed by October 1. Any other funds will be awarded on a first come, first served basis. The average award is \$1,600.

The **Federal Work Study**. The Federal Work Study Program is an employment program. Funds are allocated to schools as part of the campus-based programs as explained above. Eligible students are offered part-time employment. The Financial Aid Office, in conjunction with the academic staff, determines through an interview if a student is eligible for employment, based on his abilities to fulfill his academic responsibilities with the added burden of employment. Employment is also contingent on student qualifications of the positions available.

Federal Work Study disbursements are in the form of payrolls, distributed monthly during the duration of the of the student's work schedule, until the allocated funds are exhausted. The institution pays a percentage of matching funds for each federal dollar of Work Study. The institutional portion may be paid to the student or may be credited to the student's tuition account. For current years the funds are matched 25% institutional to 75% federal.

VERIFICATION

Applications for Federal Financial Aid may be selected for verification of various items before disbursement of aid. All federal student aid programs are affected by verification:

Pell Grant - A valid Student Aid Report (SAR) must be received by the last date of enrollment.

Campus-Based (Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant and Federal College Work-Study) - Verification must be completed within 120 days from the last date of enrollment.

We will not disburse any Federal Aid until verification is complete.

We will notify the student that verification is complete, generally within two weeks of submission. Any revisions to the awards will be reflected on the Financial Aid Adjusted Award Letter.

More information about the verification process can be obtained in the Financial Aid Office.

Aid received from any of the Federal programs must be used only for educational purposes.

No payment of student financial aid funds will be made if the student is in default on a federal student loan or owes an obligation to a federal student grant program.

Students must carry at least a half-time academic load (six credits per semester) and be enrolled in an approved degree or certificate program of study to receive financial aid. In addition, the student must make measurable progress toward the degree, and remain in good academic standing.

Financial aid funds (except FWS) are disbursed directly to the student's tuition account. We will disburse one half the entire annual award during the fall semester and the balance of the award at the beginning of the spring semester. FWS is disbursed monthly on or about 15th of the month following employment.

Students have a right to appeal financial aid decisions to the President. All appeals must be filed in writing.

Students must reapply for financial aid at the beginning of each academic year and must conform to published deadline dates.

The time period for submitting documentation is 120 days from the end of enrollment. The consequence of failing to submit documentation is not being eligible for federal aid, although they still can be eligible for institutional aid.

If there would be an instance of suspected financial aid fraud that a student is involved in, a complaint will be filed online at: <https://oighotlineportal.ed.gov/eCasePortal/> which is the Office of Inspector General at the Department of Education.

Students not maintaining SAP (Satisfactory Academic Progress) will not be eligible for aid. Once SAP has been achieved aid will be reinstated. For further information, please refer to the section on Satisfactory Academic Progress (page 36).

MARYLAND STATE SCHOLARSHIPS

A student who is a Maryland resident and wishes to be considered for a Maryland State Scholarship must file his Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by the deadline set by the State, generally March 1, for the upcoming school year. For answers to questions concerning state grants, call the Maryland Higher Education Commission at (410) 767-3300 during regular business hours.

The state offers several scholarships. The most common are as follows:

Educational Assistance Grant – Low-income grant for students who maintain a 'C' average in school.

Guaranteed Access Grant – Four year grant for graduates of Maryland high schools that will pay up to the cost of education at University of Maryland less the Pell Grant. A 'C' average must be maintained. Family must be eligible for the free lunch program.

Senatorial and Delegate scholarships – Disbursed by the student’s state senator or delegate. An application should be requested from their office.

INSTITUTIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

In addition to the programs listed above, Ner Israel offers an institutional scholarship program. This program allows the tuition committee to help those students who are either not receiving any funding from the above sources, or at the discretion of the committee, not receiving enough funding to allow them to continue their education. If a FAFSA has not been submitted the family is asked to fill out a short one page, 2-sided form asking general questions about the family’s financial situation. The committee is made up of several members, of which Rabbi Boruch Neuberger is the head of the committee and can be reached by email (byn@nirc.edu) or phone (443-548-6060) to discuss decisions of the committee.

AVAILABILITY OF FULL TIME EMPLOYEE TO ASSIST ENROLLED AND PROSPECTIVE STUDENTS

Ner Yisroel has designated Shmuel Schachter, Director of Compliance and Financial Aid, as the full-time employee available to assist enrolled and prospective students in obtaining information on financial aid programs available, criteria for eligibility, and procedure for applying for financial aid, cost of attendance, retention rates, completion and transfer rates, institutional security and crime statistics, and all required disclosures and information, as required by 668.42, 668.43, 668.45 and 668.46 of the Code of Federal Regulations. He can be found in the administrative offices during regular business hours.

WITHDRAWAL AND REFUND POLICY

Any student who must leave during the school year should inform the Dean of Students, Rabbi Beryl Weisbord, preferably, in writing or via email at rbw@nirc.edu. The official date of withdrawal is the date that the student indicates in his notice or the date of notification, whichever is earlier.

Ner Israel confirms attendance in each course that every student is registered, at the beginning of each semester. Attendance is confirmed again at the 60% point of the semester. This process of confirmation of attendance enables the school to confirm enrollment for enrollment reporting purposes and to determine if a student who withdraws without giving official notification has attended 60% of the semester. A student who is not in attendance at that 60% point is determined to have withdrawn at the midpoint of the semester.

A careful inquiry will be made for any student who fails to complete all coursework for a semester and receives all non-passing grades to determine if the student withdrew from all classes or if he actually earned any of the failed grades.

In any semester, withdrawal before the semester begins will allow for a 100% refund.

For the fall and spring semesters, tuition will be refunded according to the following schedule:

RETURN OF TITLE IV FUNDS

For all Title IV eligible students who withdraw during a semester, the institution performs an R2T4 calculation utilizing the Return to Title IV software provided by the U.S. Department of Education. The institution determines the date of withdrawal to be used in the R2T4 calculation.

For a student who gave official notification, the date of withdrawal is the date that the student indicates in his notice or the date of notification, whichever is earlier.

Generally, if a student officially withdraws before 60% of the semester has passed, he will be able to retain a prorated portion of the financial aid award based on the number of days attended and the number of days in the semester. If he withdraws after 60% of the semester has passed he will most likely be able to retain all of the financial aid he has been awarded.

For a student who withdraws without giving official notification, the date of withdrawal is the midpoint of the semester, and the student will be able to retain 50% of the Title IV funds disbursed or the amount that could have been disbursed. If there is a last documented date of attendance in class or at an academically related activity, the R2T4 may be calculated based on this date. This may enable the student to retain a prorated portion of the financial aid award based on the number of days he attended and the number of days in the semester.

If the calculation on the U.S. Department of Education's R2T4 system results in the need to return funds to the Title IV programs, funds will be returned to the various federal financial aid programs according to the following order:

- i. Federal Pell Grants
- ii. FSEOG

Refunds and returns of Title IV funds will be made within forty-five days of the date of determination that a student has withdrawn. Institutional charges that were previously paid by FSA funds might become a debit that the student will be responsible to pay.

RETURNING UNEARNED AID

Within 30 days of determining that a student who withdrew must repay all or part of a Title IV grant, the school will notify the student that he must repay the overpayment or make satisfactory arrangements to repay it. The student may sign a repayment agreement with the school or with the US Department of Education or pay the overpayment to the school. If a student fails to pay or sign a repayment agreement with the school or with the US Department of Education, the

school will report the overpayment to NSLDS and refer it to the Default Resolution Group for collection.

POST WITHDRAWAL DISBURSEMENTS

Students who withdraw in the middle of the semester will have an R2T4 calculation performed to determine if they earned more funds than funds that had already been disbursed at the time of withdrawal. If a student earned more funds than funds disbursed at the time of withdrawal, he qualifies for a post withdrawal disbursement and may be offered those funds.

A post withdrawal disbursement of Title IV funds may be credited to a student's account for current allowable charges such as tuition, fees, room and board, up to the outstanding amount of these charges. The school will obtain a student's authorization to credit a student's account with Title IV grant funds for charges other than the current year charges.

Any amount of the post withdrawal disbursement that is in excess of the balance of allowable charges will be disbursed to the student as soon as possible, but no later than forty-five days after the date of determination of withdrawal.

CREDIT BALANCE PROCEDURES

If the R2T4 calculation results in a Title IV credit balance on the student's account, the amount of the credit will be disbursed to the student within fourteen days of the date of the R2T4 calculation.

TIMELY PROCESSING OF REFUND CHECKS

Ner Israel reviews bank accounts monthly, to ensure that all refund checks have cleared the account. In the event that a check has not cleared, we will notify the student that his refund check is outstanding. The student also has the opportunity to request a duplicate check if he misplaced the original check. Title IV funds will be returned to the Department of Education in the event they are left in the account 240 days from when the original check was issued.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

INTRODUCTION

Following the tradition of the great citadels of higher learning that existed in Eastern Europe before the Holocaust, the curriculum offered by the Ner Israel Rabbinical College is focused primarily on Talmudic study.

Students entering Ner Israel directly out of high school or transferring from other postsecondary institutions are exposed to a rigorous course of study in Talmud and related courses. By the time these students graduate from Ner Israel, they have been transformed into emerging Talmudic scholars by virtue of a demanding academic curriculum and a preeminent faculty.

The skills cover a broad range including: advancing language aptitudes in Aramaic and Loshon Kodesh; teaching the close examination of ancient/ medieval scholarly texts; contextual thinking and analysis of contrasting opinions and concepts; interpretive reasoning; structured communication; problem solving; creative application of legal principles; understanding abstract thinking; conceiving theories and evaluating chains of logic; applying legal principles to real life cases; retaining large amounts of scholarship with precision.

UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE – BACHELOR OF TALMUDIC LAW (BTL)

Ner Israel offers a four year undergraduate program culminating in a Bachelor of Talmudic Law (BTL). Ner Israel assumes that many of its undergraduates will proceed on to graduate degree program in Talmudic studies. Following a time honored tradition; these students will generally dedicate themselves to their studies for six years or more.

MORNING CURRICULUM – TALMUD INTENSIVE AND TALMUD LAW COURSES

Following the pattern of most American Talmudic colleges, the Ner Israel curriculum is focused primarily on the study of Talmud. Advanced study of the Talmud at Ner Israel follows the classic 'Lithuanian' model, the hallmark of the great Yeshivas that existed in Lithuania. In this model, the Bais Medrash, or Talmudic study hall, becomes the crucible in which the budding Talmudic scholar is formed. Generally a student will spend a minimum of 6 hours each day in structured Bais Medrash learning, as well as additional time in *Shiurim* (lectures). Clearly, the total number of hours spent on Talmudic study at Ner Israel far exceeds the standard definition of credit hours in American universities.

The method of instruction combines both *Shiurim* and *Chavrusa* learning. In the *Chavrusa* system, two students are paired as learning partners for a full semester. This *Chavrusa* study is a full partnership where the *Chavrusa* pair engages in animated joint study of their total curricula.

A daily *Shiur*, or faculty lecture, is the focus of the *Chavrusa* learning and its influence permeates the *Chavrusa* study as well. *Chavrusa* study generally begins with a preliminary reading of the Talmudic texts of a *Sugya* (topic) called a *Laining*. This is then followed with a rudimentary analysis of the Talmudic logic of the *Sugya*. After this background learning, the *Chavrusa* pair is charged to prepare for the daily *Shiur* (lecture) and then review it after it is delivered.

After the *Laining*, preparing for a specific *Shiur* is accomplished by a more critical reading of the specifically selected text and then carefully reviewing the supplemental references and background materials prepared by the Rebbe, or lecturer, in advance. After the *Shiur*, the *Chavrusa* pair reviews the contents of the *Shiur* in a very intense and comprehensive manner. They will review, probe and debate the logic of the *Shiur* presentation and try to clarify between themselves any areas of ambiguity. Almost always, the Rebbe himself is available for the *Seder*, or *Chavrusa* study period, to engage with his students in their review and debate. This very hands-on give and take between *Rabbayim* (instructors) and *Talmidim* (students) is a hallmark of Talmudic study.

This Talmud Intensive course is a standard requirement of all undergraduate students each semester. This course includes an intensive morning course in Talmud with its centerpiece being the daily *Shiur*, and review time that the student must do on his own.

The time-honored method of study of the Talmud is one where the most advanced experts and the beginners all focus on the same material and their understanding of it. Thus, the same tractate of Talmud is studied in Ner Israel in the undergraduate program along one of four levels (corresponding to the 100, 200, 300 and 400 level courses). The basic Talmud text is not studied in isolation, but in parallel with the commentaries expanding the passage and the Code of Law evolving from the outcome of the Talmudic discussion. Study of the Bible follows the same logical pattern. Because the Talmud itself includes a commentary on the laws of the Pentateuch, a thorough knowledge of the Bible is required to understand the Talmud. The students therefore study a correlated curriculum with courses in Talmud, Commentaries, Codes, and Bible. This system follows the tradition of the great centers of higher Jewish learning that existed in Eastern Europe before the Holocaust.

In assigning grades, the Rebbe will evaluate the totality of the student's participation and accomplishment in the entire correlated curriculum. The Rebbe will assess the quality and quantity of a student's participation and accomplishment in *Chavrusa* study, as well as in the

Shiur. Attendance and effort will also play a role. Various test and quizzes may be given by the Rebbe through the semester.

LEVEL ONE

In the first year the Rebbe attempts to provide the students with the ability to make literal readings of the Talmud and the basic commentaries appearing with the Talmudic text (Rashi and Tosafos). The student should be able to analyze a page of Talmud and recognize what needs to be explained to understand the Talmud and to learn the Rishonim (Earlier Commentators) and Acharonim (Later Commentators) and realize how they are explaining the ideas that are necessary to understand that Talmud. The second goal is that the student should develop an appreciation for a more sophisticated (Lumdish) explanation to the questions being asked, and not settle for a more superficial (Ba'al Batish) answer to the questions.

LEVEL TWO

In this level, the students being dealing with other main Sugyas (areas of concentration of a topic) in the Talmud. In addition, there are now multiple solutions to questions raised in the study of the Talmud, and each solution is followed through to see the nuanced differences in each solution. The goals here are to broaden the student's mind in comprehending the interactions between the different Sugyas in the Talmud, and to be able to follow the multiple solutions to questions raised in the the Sugya.

LEVEL THREE

In this level the Rebbe begins preparing the student for learning independently. The shiur is designed to organize the complexities in the Sugya, and to break down the Sugya into its component parts so that the student can see how each part interacts with one another. Another goal is to make them aware of the unstated assumptions the Sugya makes and to challenge those assumptions.

LEVEL FOUR

In level four, the student is taught how to develop a Sugya. To identify the main issues and clarify how each Rishon (Earlier Commentator) deals with each of those issues. The student is shown how the Rishon is consistent with his approach and all the pieces fall into place. Further, the student is made to grasp the fundamental differences that each Rishon had in starting the Sugya, and how it causes each Rishon to have his own solution that he will take consistently throughout the entire Sugya. The multiple comments, questions and answers of a Rishon on a given Sugya are now not just a bunch of random ideas, but a continuous and interlocking logic. Thus, because

of this continuous and interlocking logic, each Rishon has his own answers that could not be used to answer the other Rishon's questions.

AFTERNOON CURRICULUM – TALMUD SURVEY AND TALMUD ANALYSIS COURSES

The goal of the afternoon learning session is to provide the student with a broader grasp of the Talmud, covering more topics than the Intensive course in Talmud could. This course is called Talmud Survey. A secondary goal of this course is to help foster the students' independence in Talmudic Studies. Faculty members are available for questions and insights into the material that is being studied. Evaluation in this course is based on attendance and interaction with the various members of the faculty. Each student has the ability to work out with his academic advisor (generally their primary Rebbe) as to the material they should focus on in the afternoon session. In addition, students have the ability to put some of the afternoon session time into the various electives that are offered here at Ner Israel.

EVENING CURRICULUM

There are additional Talmud courses for students during the evening. These courses earn 3 credits per semester and require a minimum of two hours of Bais Medrash study five days a week for the entire semester. In general, students may spend time analyzing different elements of a lecture that they had heard recently. However, many choose from a broad choice of Talmudic sections and topics, or take advantage of the electives that are offered here at Ner Israel.

Students who complete the Ner Israel undergraduate program are able to move seamlessly into the Ner Israel graduate school and enroll in the Rabbinical Ordination program or the Master of Talmudic Law and Doctor of Talmudic Law degree programs. They are also academically prepared to transfer to other Talmudic graduate schools across the country and the world. Many apply, and most are accepted, to the most prestigious specialized Talmudic academies in Israel. These specialized institutions are highly selective in their enrollment and chose from the 'cream of the crop' emanating from dozens of international Talmudic undergraduate schools.

ETHICS CURRICULUM

Ethics is an integral part of the Talmudic Scholar. To this end there is a daily Ethics session after the Afternoon Prayers and weekly discourses in Ethics development and Jewish Philosophy. In addition, many of the elective courses are on topics in Ethics.

ELECTIVES

Ner Israel offers elective courses to broaden the scope of the educational program offered. These courses can allow a student to focus some of his time in an area other than Talmud. In addition, many of these courses will transfer to other colleges and assist students attempting to earn secular degrees.

TEXTBOOKS AND REQUIRED MATERIALS

All required texts can be found in the library and are available at all times for student use. However, students may acquire personal copies if they wish. No other materials are required.

Book and Supply Assistance: The college maintains a **Student Aid Fund**, administered by a senior faculty member, which provides small, discreet grants to students with demonstrated financial need to help them purchase required texts (*seforim*) and other necessary supplies. ON-CAMPUS BOOKSTORE

The Yeshiva Bookstore, an independently operated business, is located on the lower level of the Annex Classroom building. It is open for students during supper hours. The bookstore carries all popular and required texts (*seforim*) and also sells a variety of Jewish items needed for holidays, such as the four species for Sukkos. The bookstore accepts cash and credit cards for payment. For specific inquiries, the bookstore manager, Yitzchok Loewy, can be reached at 201-815-7202.

GENERAL DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

THE BACHELOR OF TALMUDIC LAW

The Bachelor of Talmudic Law degree is awarded for the completion of 120 credits with the following minimum distribution:

Talmud Intensive	40 credits
Talmud Survey	40 credits
Jewish Philosophy and Ethics	10 credits

Beyond the 90 required credits students can complete additional courses in Talmud or take elective courses.

A candidate for this degree will be required to complete a minimum of 60 credits at Ner Israel. In all cases, the last semester must be completed at this institution.

FREQUENCY OF COURSE OFFERINGS

Students enrolled at *Ner Israel* take the recommended number of courses offered each term at their grade level and progress toward their degrees in the time frame outlined in the sample curriculum. Course offerings for each semester take into account the needs of the all students, and courses are offered with enough frequency to enable students to graduate within the normal time frames. Not all courses are offered every semester.

EVALUATION AND GRADING

ACADEMIC STANDARDS

The manner in which classes are conducted at Ner Israel makes student participation in class discussions essential. Although attendance at many sessions is taken into consideration when determining grades, it is not recorded on a daily basis. Any pattern of absence is immediately

forwarded to the Dean of Men for prompt action. Students must also maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) or better to remain in good standing.

Every attempt is also made to aid weaker students in their studies by giving them special attention and enlisting the help of senior and graduate students.

GRADES AND EXAMINATIONS

Because different courses lend themselves to different evaluation procedures, each instructor has the responsibility of explaining his method of evaluating academic achievement. The grading system followed at the Ner Israel Rabbinical College is based on a combination of criteria. These include an evaluation by instructors of the student's classroom interaction, oral examinations, and written tests. A student can elect to take a class as a P/F where the P would indicate a "Pass" (Denotes a grade of C or above), but this is not commonly used. To elect to take a class as P/F a student needs to appeal to the Dean of Men.

The Grade Point Average is calculated by dividing the total number of quality points earned for all courses by the number of credit hours attempted. Credit hours with a grade of Incomplete, Withdrawn without penalty and Pass are not included in the determination of the grade point average, although those hours with a grade of Fail are included.

GRADE APPEALS PROCESS

A student who wishes to appeal a grade that he received must complete an appeal form and submit it to the registrar. He will give the appeal over to a committee of faculty members who will consider all relevant information, i.e., mitigating circumstances such as illness or death in the immediate family or other unusual situations. This committee will then decide whether or not to grant the appeal.

ATTENDANCE

Although formal attendance is not required at Ner Israel, students are expected to attend all classes regularly. Many classes will take attendance into account when determining final grades. In addition, excessive unexcused absences may be grounds for dismissal.

TRANSCRIPTS

The registrar will issue transcripts only upon written request of the student concerned. There is no charge for this service. Transcripts officially transmitted directly to another college or university, or other official institution or agency, receive the seal of Ner Israel.

Transcripts will not be issued if the student is delinquent in responsibilities to Ner Israel, or if they do not adhere to the Jewish Code of Law.

SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS

All regular students pursuing an approved program at Ner Israel Rabbinical College are required to maintain satisfactory academic progress toward graduation, which, in this institution is defined as being in good academic standing as detailed below. Students are only eligible to receive Title IV federal financial aid as long as they maintain satisfactory academic progress. The satisfactory progress standards for students who receive Title IV federal financial aid are the same as for all regular students enrolled at Ner Israel Rabbinical College.

Satisfactory academic progress at Ner Israel has two principal components: a qualitative standard and a quantitative standard:

QUALITATIVE STANDARD

The student must achieve a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 (the equivalent of a “C” average) or better. Students are evaluated at the end of each semester.

QUANTITATIVE STANDARD

Maximum Timeframe

A full time student must make sufficient progress through the academic program to complete the 120 credits, four-year undergraduate program, within a time period of not more than six years (twelve semesters). which is 150% of the published length.

A part time student must make sufficient progress through the academic program to complete the 120 credit, four-year undergraduate program, within a time period of not more than ten years (thirty semesters), which is 150% of the published length.

PACE OF COMPLETION

Students must successfully complete 67% of their attempted credits per semester, with a maximum attempted credits ceiling of 180 credits. Below are sample charts illustrating how maximum time frame and pace of completion are applied for a full time student. The number of credits an individual student must earn may vary from what is depicted in the chart based on his enrollment schedule.

At the end of each semester, students' academic files are evaluated to determine if the students are making satisfactory academic progress. As part of the evaluation the student's earned credits are divided by the student's attempted credits to determine if the student is progressing through the four-year academic program at a pace sufficient to complete the program within the maximum time frame. If the number of credits earned divided by the number of credits attempted is 67% or greater and the student has earned at least the number of credits that appears in the chart above that corresponds to his semester of attendance, he is determined to be making satisfactory progress.

Ner Israel Rabbinical College requires full time status for undergraduate students. Exceptions may be made, only with formal permission from the Dean.

FINANCIAL AID WARNING AND ACADEMIC PROBATION

If it is determined at the end of a semester that a student is not making satisfactory progress, the student will be given a financial aid warning in writing during which time he maintains financial aid eligibility. The warning period will last for one semester. During the financial aid warning period, the Dean will counsel the student and attempt to improve the student's performance by providing various student services that might include special tutoring, a new study plan or a scheduling accommodation. If after this financial aid warning period satisfactory progress standards are still not met, the student will be notified that he will be terminated from financial aid. He will be notified that he has the option of appealing his lack of satisfactory academic progress. Procedures for filing an appeal are described in the section below. If the student successfully appeals the lack of satisfactory progress after the financial aid warning he will be placed on academic probation for one semester.

The Dean will monitor the student during the period of probation and will devise a study plan to enable the student to improve his academic standing. This may involve conferences with the student and his instructors. If during the probation period the student's academic performance improves and the student's progress is within satisfactory academic progress standards, the probationary status will terminate.

If after the period of probation, the student's academic performance still fails to meet the academic progress standards of the institution, he will be subject to academic discipline which may include expulsion or suspension from the institution, and will be ineligible to receive Title IV federal financial aid.

All decisions with respect to a student's failure to satisfy satisfactory academic progress and subsequent determinations will be documented in the student's academic folder.

APPEALS PROCESS, MITIGATING CIRCUMSTANCES

A student who wishes to appeal a determination of probationary status, lack of satisfactory progress, or similar issues must submit an appeal in writing to the Dean of Men. The Dean will consider all relevant information, i.e., mitigating circumstances such as illness or death in the immediate family or other unusual situations. The student must also explain how his situation has changed to allow him to make satisfactory progress. The Dean will consult with faculty members as appropriate.

The Dean's decision will be conveyed to the student in writing within ten days of receipt of the student's written appeal.

REINSTATEMENT

When it is determined, by examining his progress for the semester, that a student who was not making satisfactory progress has improved his average and attained sufficient credits to bring his total to the appropriate number for the semesters completed, the student will be notified that he may once again receive aid from Title IV program. The Dean will notify the Financial Aid Office of each student's status at the start of each semester.

To re-establish good standing, students must consult with the Dean of Students, who will design a study plan to assist the student in raising his grades. The Dean of Students will inform the Financial Aid Office when he determines that the student is successfully implementing the study plan. Such notifications will allow the student to again participate in the aid programs until the completion of the semester. Students who do not take advantage of the Dean of Student's program shall continue to have their financial aid eligibility suspended until the time they can establish satisfactory progress.

INCOMPLETES AND WITHDRAWALS

If a student has not completed all required course work, he may have up to six months, at the discretion of the instructor, to complete the work. If it can be determined that, without passing this course, the student will be in compliance with Satisfactory Progress standards, the incomplete will not be considered to affect his average or his satisfactory progress in that interim. If it is determined that, without passing this course the student will not be in compliance with satisfactory progress standards, the student's faculty advisor will meet with the Dean of Men to discuss the situation. If they are able to determine that the student is making efforts in

good faith to complete the missing work, they may allow him to retain the status of satisfactory progress in the interim.

Students who withdraw or fail to complete a course will have the course recorded as Withdrawn Without Penalty. This grade will not be counted in the student's GPA. However, the course(s) will be counted towards the student's number of credits attempted.

TRANSFER CREDITS AND SATISFACTORY PROGRESS

Transfer credits are not included in the GPA calculation; however, the credits accepted are counted toward both the number of attempted credits and the number of credits earned by the student.

REPETITIONS

A student who fails a course may repeat the course. Upon successful completion of the course, the grade for the failing course will be replaced with the passing grade. In computing the GPA, from the term in which the course is repeated, only the grade for the passed course will be counted. All repeated courses are counted in the number of attempted credits.

ESL/NONCREDIT REMEDIAL COURSES

Ner Israel Rabbinical College does not offer any ESL or non-credit remedial courses.

CHANGE OF MAJOR

Ner Israel Rabbinical College only offers a program leading to a Bachelor of Talmudic Law, Students are automatically assigned a Major in Talmud as no other majors are available. As such, all credits taken at this institution are considered when evaluating whether a student is maintaining Satisfactory Academic Progress.

TRANSFER CREDITS

Credits may be granted, at the discretion of Ner Israel, for courses taken at another postsecondary institution of Talmudic Studies providing the following stipulations are met:

I. GENERAL POLICY FOR TRANSFER OF CREDITS

Ner Israel Rabbinical College accepts transfer credits for coursework that is similar in content, style, and academic rigor to that offered at the College. The student must have earned a passing grade, and all credits must be documented via an official transcript submitted by the applicant's previous school for evaluation. It is the student / applicant's responsibility to contact his previous school to have them submit to the registrar an official record of his previous scholastic work for evaluation.

II. LIMITATIONS ON CREDITS

In accordance with COMAR regulations, the acceptance of transfer credits is subject to the following limitations:

- A maximum of 60 credits can be transferred into the undergraduate program.
- These transferred credits are limited to the first two years of the undergraduate educational experience.
- Policy for International Transfer Credits: The College utilizes a multi-faceted evaluation process to ensure the academic quality of credits earned at international institutions. The primary criterion for acceptance is that the international institution's academic programs are recognized and utilized by U.S. regionally-accredited universities. Many of the international institutions from which the College accepts credits are the same institutions that form the official study abroad programs other colleges and universities. This primary criterion is further supplemented by a secondary institutional review process, which includes
 - Verification that the international institution's credits are accepted on transfer by at least three other accredited U.S. institutions, a standard aligned with federal SEVIS requirements.
 - Direct evaluation by the College's own academic experts, who may visit international institutions to personally ascertain the quality of their programs.

The credits transferred must be based on course work similar in content, style and academic rigor to the one offered at Ner Israel. The student must have achieved a grade that would have enabled him to pass a similar course at Ner Israel. All credits must be properly documented. Transfer credits accepted are counted towards the number of attempted credits and the number of credits earned by the student. It is the student / applicant's responsibility to contact his

previous school to have them submit to the registrar an official record of his previous scholastic work for evaluation. The maximum amount of credits able to be transferred into Ner Israel is 2 years of undergraduate work.

Please be advised that the transferability of credits and acceptance of the degree earned at Ner Israel are at the complete discretion of an institution to which a student may seek to transfer. If the credits or the degree earned at this institution are not accepted at the institution to which a student seeks to transfer, he may be required to repeat some or all of the coursework at that institution.

At the current time Ner Israel does not accept credit from competency-based education credit through the College Level Examination Program (CLEP), Advanced Placement (AP) Program, International Baccalaureate (IB) Program, Advanced Level Examinations (GCE A-Levels) or DANTES Subject Standardized Tests (DSST).

At the current time we generally do not evaluate and award credit for prior learning experience including, but not limited to, service in the armed forces, paid or unpaid employment, or other demonstrated competency or learning. The exception to this rule is prior learning experience in Talmud or other Judaic studies.

Transfer of Credits into Ner Israel - At the current time, Ner Israel Rabbinical College does not have any formal articulation agreements for accepting credits from other institutions. Credits may be granted on a case-by-case basis as outlined in this catalog.

Transfer of Ner Israel Credits to Other Institutions - Ner Israel Rabbinical College does have articulation agreements and/or Memorandums of Understanding with the University of Maryland Baltimore County, University of Maryland Global Campus, Stevenson University, and Touro University Worldwide. These agreements facilitate the acceptance of certain Ner Israel courses into their bachelor's degree programs. Additionally, we have a Memorandums of Understanding with Johns Hopkins University for the acceptance of our Bachelors degree into their Masters Program.

Decisions regarding transfer credits are subject to the same appeals process described above (page 39).

GROUNDINGS FOR DISMISSAL

Students are expected to keep the hours of Ner Israel Rabbinical College's course and study schedule, and attend all lectures. They must also complete regular oral and/or written exams and maintain satisfactory progress.

Students who fail to adhere to Ner Israel Rabbinical College's regulations, keep the Jewish Code of Law, and/or do not maintain satisfactory academic progress (after being warned about maintaining SAP), may be placed on probation. If improvement is not seen, the Dean will notify the student that he may be dismissed from the school.

Students who persistently violate Ner Israel Rabbinical College's rules of conduct and discipline may also be dismissed from Ner Israel Rabbinical College.

It should be noted that dismissals are extremely rare as every effort is made to accept students of high character and diligence.

COMPLAINT POLICIES

INTERNAL COMPLAINT PROCEDURE:

Any student who has a complaint should submit it in writing to the Dean of Men (rbw@nirc.edu) or to the Yeshiva's mailing address. The complaint will be investigated, and the student will be informed in writing within 10 days of the resolution of his complaint. No person directly involved in the complaint issue will make the final determination of the complaint.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES AT NER ISRAEL RABBINICAL COLLEGE

All students are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that reflects the high ethical and moral standards of the college. Behavior that infringes upon the rights, safety, or comfort of other members of the community is not permitted.

- **Academic Integrity:** Students must submit their own work and are prohibited from academic dishonesty. Violations are referred to the Dean of Men for disciplinary measures, which can include failing a course or expulsion. (on page 51)
- **Adherence to Jewish Code of Law:** Students must adhere to the Jewish Code of Law to remain in good standing. (on page 42)
- **Attendance:** Students are expected to attend all classes regularly. Excessive unexcused absences may be grounds for dismissal. (on page 42)
- **Campus Rules and Conduct:** Students must abide by all campus regulations. Persistent violation of these rules may lead to dismissal from the college. (on page 42)
- **Compliance with Federal Copyright Laws:** Students are apprised of the civil and criminal penalties for copyright infringement, including unauthorized peer-to-peer file sharing, and are expected to comply with federal law. (on page 53)
- **Dormitory Conduct:** Students are expected to maintain quiet in the dormitories, especially during late hours, and are prohibited from smoking in buildings, cooking in rooms, or bringing alcoholic beverages to the Yeshiva. (on page 52)

STUDENT GOVERNANCE: THE GABBAIM LEADERSHIP SYSTEM

At Ner Israel Rabbinical College, student leadership is not just encouraged; it is an integral component of our institutional fabric. In keeping with our mission to develop future leaders for the Jewish community, the college fosters student participation in institutional decision-making through its traditional and highly respected system of Gabbaim (student representatives). This unique form of student government, typically composed of three to four students, is a cornerstone of campus life, ensuring that the student perspective is woven into the daily operations of the college.

The Role and Selection of a Gabbai

The title of Gabbai is one of historical significance in Jewish communal life, denoting an individual entrusted with the needs of the community. At Ner Israel, Gabbaim are senior students who have earned the deep respect of their peers and the confidence of the faculty and administration. The leadership consists of a Head Gabbai, who works collaboratively with the other representatives, rather than in a supervisory role. A Gabbai will typically serve for a term of two to three years.

The selection process is a collaborative, three-part framework designed to ensure representation and approval from all segments of the college community:

Nomination by Peers: Candidates are first nominated by the outgoing Gabbaim, who act on behalf of the student body to identify individuals with the character and leadership qualities necessary for the role.

Faculty Endorsement: The nominations are then presented to the faculty for their review and endorsement, ensuring that candidates meet the high academic and ethical standards of the institution.

Administrative Approval: Finally, the nominations are formally approved by the college administration, cementing the Gabbai's role as an official student leader.

Comprehensive Responsibilities of the Gabbaim

Student Advocacy and Liaison: The Gabbaim serve as the primary point of contact for the student body. They provide a responsible forum for student views and are charged with escalating student concerns to the appropriate administrative or faculty member. To ensure consistent and open communication, the Gabbaim hold formal meetings with members of the faculty and administration every Shabbos and most Friday mornings to discuss student life and address any emerging issues.

Campus Life and Community Building: A major focus of the Gabbaim is to foster a positive campus environment. They are responsible for helping to maintain decorum in the dormitories and are actively involved in organizing student activities, such as special weekend getaways and social events.

Administrative and Logistical Support: The Gabbaim provide crucial support for the college's operations. At the beginning of each semester (zman), they are responsible for managing student room placements. Furthermore, they serve as the official hosts for campus guests, providing tours and acting as ambassadors for the institution.

ACADEMIC COUNSELING / ADVISEMENT

Rabbi Ifrah meets with every new student individually for orientation. He explains the course schedule, transfer credit policy, academic rules, and expectations. He is available in the afternoons for advisement on secular degree options, college counseling, and other academic and career counseling. Students can schedule a meeting with Rabbi Ifrah using a link provided via email, or the tablet that is designated for meeting scheduling outside of Rabbi Ifrah's office. Other members of the faculty are also available to counsel students on career advice and guidance.

Ner Israel has partnered with Mrs. Faige Katz, a career coach at Career360 for career counseling. Career360 offers the Highlands Ability Battery and Natural Abilities test to measure aptitude and offer insight into how students' natural abilities and cognitive predispositions can influence their career opportunities.

Placement Services

Ner Israel Rabbinical College is an academic institution and does not provide vocational training nor guarantee employment or placement to students who complete its programs. However, the college is deeply invested in the success of its students and graduates and will provide career guidance and networking assistance whenever possible.

Our approach to career services is rooted in the personal relationships between our students, faculty, and our extensive alumni network. The process is an informal one, designed to provide personalized support.

How to Access Services

A student seeking career advice or placement assistance should begin by approaching his Rebbe or the Registrar for an oral discussion about his goals. There are no forms to fill out. The faculty or registrar will then leverage the personal contacts of the administration and faculty to connect the student with alumni and professionals in the appropriate field.

Types of Support - While the support varies based on individual needs, assistance may include:

Resume review and guidance; Sharing relevant job postings that have come to the college; Making direct, personal introductions to alumni and contacts in a student's field of interest.

Fields with Strong Alumni Connections - Through our graduates, we have developed strong networking connections in a variety of professional fields, including: The Rabbinate and Jewish Education; Non-Profit Management; Finance; Real Estate; Accounting; and Law.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

Every student must submit only their own work and not the work of others. If any faculty member feels that a student has violated this academic integrity, the matter will be referred to the Dean of Men for appropriate disciplinary measures. This may include, but is not limited to, failing a course or expulsion from the Yeshiva.

ACCESS TO STUDENT RECORDS (FERPA)

Ner Israel abides by the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA). Pursuant to this act students have the right "to inspect and review any and all official records, files and data directly related to them" and to deny access to others without their written consent except under specified circumstances. All information due the student under this act is available from the Registrar or Financial Aid Administrator in the administration building during normal business hours.

CAMPUS SECURITY

Ner Israel Rabbinical College is fortunate to be located in a suburban setting away from main roads. That being said the following precautions are in place to help maintain a safe and secure environment.

Entrances to the campus are monitored by surveillance cameras and license plate readers. The guard booth is manned overnight and will deny entry if needed. Dormitories are locked and can only be opened by either a valid student ID card, or secure combination.

David Friedman is the head of Campus Security and can be reached at all times on his cell 443-803-8596. All suspicious activity should be reported to him. In the event that he cannot be reached, Rabbi Yehuda Friedman is his assistant in this area and can be reached on his cell at 443-825-2603. The Campus Security Report is filed annually in October. Notice is posted to inform the students that it is available all year long in the administration building during normal business hours.

If a student feels he has been treated inappropriately in any way by anyone in the Yeshiva, he is encouraged to bring it immediately to the attention of any member of the Hanhala. He will be referred to an outside authority who is empowered to investigate accusations which will be responded to in the appropriate manner.

DORMITORY LIFE

Quiet Hours: To maintain an environment conducive to study and rest, students are expected to maintain quiet in the dormitories, especially during late-night hours. The Bais Medrash (study hall) is the appropriate venue for late-night study.

General Rules: Smoking is prohibited in all college buildings. Cooking is not permitted in dormitory rooms. Students may not bring alcoholic beverages to the Yeshiva.

Jewish music may be played in a manner that does not disturb others. Secular novels, magazines, and newspapers are not allowed in the Yeshiva.

DRESS CODE

Students are expected to dress in a manner befitting בני תורה at all times. Even when engaging in exercise or sports, a student has the responsibility to look respectable. Sleeves and long pants are required in public. Even when walking in the dormitory, please show respect to yourself and others. Jewish music may be played in a manner that does not disturb others.

DRUGS AND ALCOHOL POLICY

Illegal drug use and alcohol consumption will not be tolerated under any circumstances (with the exception of minimal amounts of wine for sacramental use).

Ner Israel is committed to maintaining a drug-free campus. Counseling for drug abuse is available to students, faculty and employees through the CounterForce program of Torah Umesorah National Society of Hebrew Day Schools

GUEST POLICY AND PARIETAL RULES

Students are allowed to bring guests to campus as long as they do not interfere with the comfort or studies of other students. The Dean of Men reserves the right to refuse entry to any guest whom he feels does not belong on campus. For overnight accommodations, the **Gabbaim** are in charge of dorm hospitality and should be contacted to plan arrangements.

As the college dormitories are single-gender facilities, **female guests are not permitted in the student dormitory buildings.**

NON-DISCRIMINATION

Men of the Jewish faith are admitted to the Ner Israel Rabbinical College without regard to race, color, national or ethnic origin, or disability. Ner Israel Rabbinical College is in full compliance with all federal and state laws pertaining to non-discrimination on the basis of race, ethnic origin, age, and disability. Any such discrimination infractions should be directed to the Dean of Men.

STUDENT RIGHT-TO-KNOW ACT

Information regarding crimes committed on campus, completion and withdrawal rates, and other information required by the Student Right to Know Act can be obtained from the Registrar in the administration building during normal business hours, or at our website www.nirc.edu .

SUMMARY OF CIVIL AND CRIMINAL PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF FEDERAL COPYRIGHT LAWS

As per 34 CFR 668.43(a)(10), students of Ner Israel are hereby apprised that unauthorized distribution of copyrighted material, including unauthorized peer-to-peer file sharing, may subject the student to civil and criminal liabilities. Summary of Civil and Criminal Penalties for Violation of Federal Copyright Laws Copyright infringement is the act of exercising, without permission or legal authority, one or more of the exclusive rights granted to the copyright owner under section 106 of the Copyright Act (Title 17 of the United States Code). These rights include

the right to reproduce or distribute a copyrighted work. In the file-sharing context, downloading or uploading substantial parts of a copyrighted work without authority constitutes an infringement. Penalties for copyright infringement include civil and criminal penalties. In general, anyone found liable for civil copyright infringement may be ordered to pay either actual damages or “statutory” damages affixed at not less than \$750 and not more than \$30,000 per work infringed. For “willful” infringement, a court may award up to \$150,000 per work infringed. A court can, in its discretion, also assess costs and attorneys’ fees. For details, see Title 17, United States Code, Sections 504, 505. Unauthorized Peer-to-Peer Sharing

Unauthorized peer-to-peer sharing is a copyright violation, and is prohibited by law, as well as by Ner Israel. Ner Israel does not have an institutional information technology system for students.

TECHNOLOGY

Besides the obvious risk that technology poses to one's spiritual growth, it can also distract from serious immersion in one's studies. Smartphones are an even greater challenge. First and Second year students are not allowed to have smartphones on campus. We strongly encourage all students to avoid using smartphones.

Computers, smartphones and other internet capable devices may only be used for assistance in one's studies - not for entertainment of any sort. If a student must have an internet connection for his studies, he must acknowledge the challenge that this will pose and take the proper steps to ensure his use of it does not hamper his spiritual growth. We have partnered with TAG of Baltimore to provide technology filtering solutions for our students. Any internet-capable device brought to yeshiva must have the yeshiva's approved filter installed on it. Volunteers from TAG

Baltimore will be available to install filters toward the beginning of the semester, and Rabbi Eli Katz is available in the administration building during the lunch break. Not adhering to the Yeshiva's guidelines may result in the confiscation of the device and possibly the suspension/expulsion of the student from the Yeshiva. Devices that are confiscated will automatically become the property of the Yeshiva and will not be returned.

In addition, all cell phones should be kept in a place where they will not be a distraction to yourself or others. Cell phones are not to be used in the main Bais Medrash building.

TEXTBOOK INFORMATION

Ner Yisroel offers a highly specialized program of study in Talmud and related subjects. All textbooks are readily available for use on open stacks in the study hall and school library. Students who wish to purchase their own copies of the texts studied may purchase them from one of the local Judaic bookstores stores in the area. Many students prefer to have their own Gemara which costs between \$20-\$50, depending on the publisher and edition, and a Kovetz Miforshim which costs between \$25 and \$45. Most texts used in the program are reprints of the Talmud and other classical texts that do not have ISBN numbers.

STUDENT INFORMATION AND SERVICES

ALUMNI ACTIVITIES

Ner Israel Rabbinical College is deeply committed to maintaining a lifelong relationship with its nearly ten thousand alumni, who are the primary ambassadors of our mission. Our alumni relations program is proactive and designed to provide continuous spiritual, professional, and personal support long after graduation.

Ongoing Mentorship and Support

The close, personal connection between students and faculty does not end upon graduation. Alumni are encouraged to maintain their relationships with their Rebbeim, frequently consulting them for guidance on personal and professional matters. Furthermore, the college administration plays a significant role in assisting alumni in finding new positions, particularly in the rabbinate and in Jewish education.

Learning and Community Events

To foster a continuous connection to the Yeshiva and to Torah learning, the college hosts a variety of events throughout the year:

- "Shabbos of Chizuk" (Sabbath of Strength): An annual weekend in Baltimore where senior faculty engage with the local community, delivering lectures at area synagogues and hosting special Friday night gatherings (onegs) for alumni .
- Evenings of Chizuk: These special gatherings provide alumni with an opportunity to hear words of inspiration and reconnect with the Yeshiva and their peers.
- Yarchei Kallah (Learning Seminars): The college runs intensive learning seminars for alumni, often scheduled on legal holidays or in conjunction with other major events, such as the annual dinner.
- "Lunch & Learn" Programs: Members of our faculty travel to various cities to host informal "Lunch & Learn" events, giving alumni a chance to learn and socialize with their Rebbeim in a relaxed setting.

Digital Outreach and Communication

The Yeshiva utilizes modern technology to keep our alumni connected to the daily life of the Yeshiva, no matter where they live.

- **Online Audio Library:** The college has launched torah.nirc.edu, a comprehensive online audio library. This website gives alumni and the public access to a vast archive of thousands of lectures and discourses delivered at Ner Israel by faculty and esteemed scholars over the past several decades, making the Yeshiva's Torah accessible anywhere in the world.
- **Weekly Updates:** Alumni receive regular email updates that include a video of a weekly lecture (shiur) from one of the Rebbeim, news from the campus, and the sharing of community news and happy occasions (simchas).
- **Holiday Publications:** For each major Jewish holiday, the college produces and distributes a kuntres (a collection of Torah essays) featuring insights from our Roshei Yeshiva, faculty, and current students, allowing alumni to share the Yeshiva's Torah with their own communities.

COOPERATIVE WORK AND FIELD EXPERIENCES

While Ner Israel Rabbinical College does not offer formal cooperative work experiences for academic credit, the college provides and facilitates several opportunities for students to gain practical, hands-on experience in fields related to education and community leadership. These programs are a vital part of our commitment to producing well-rounded graduates prepared for positions of service.

Substitute Teaching Program: In partnership with local Jewish day schools, the college provides opportunities for our students to serve as substitute teachers. This program allows students who are considering a career in education to gain valuable classroom experience, develop pedagogical skills, and serve the local community.

Project SEED Summer Program: Ner Israel is actively involved with the national Project SEED program, an educational outreach fellowship. Each summer, the college facilitates the placement of approximately 40-50 students in about 9- 12 locations across North America and beyond. Participants travel to smaller Jewish communities to teach and study with community members, creating temporary centers for Torah learning. This intensive experience allows our students to develop their teaching abilities and leadership skills in a real-world setting.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES & RECREATION

Ner Israel Rabbinical College encourages students to pursue healthy and balanced lives, which includes opportunities for recreation and community involvement that complement their intensive academic schedule.

Athletics and Recreation - Our spacious campus provides students with several venues for physical activity and recreation. Facilities include outdoor basketball courts and open fields suitable for pickup football and baseball games . These areas are always open for student use. While the college does not sponsor formal intramural sports leagues, students frequently organize informal pickup games. Many students bring their own sports equipment to share with their peers.

We are pleased to announce that a new, state-of-the-art gymnasium is currently under construction, with an estimated completion date of June 2026. This facility will significantly enhance our recreational offerings and will feature full-size basketball courts and a dedicated exercise room with modern cardio equipment.

Student Lounges - Each of our two main dormitories contains a student lounge area. These lounges provide a space for students to relax and socialize, and are equipped with exercise equipment and ping-pong tables for indoor recreation.

Student Activities and Community Service - While there are no official student clubs, many activities are organized by students for their peers, often with the help of student volunteers who assist the Gabbaim with event planning.

Furthermore, students are strongly encouraged to participate in community service. These activities are a hallmark of the Ner Israel experience and include:

Visiting Senior Citizens: Every Friday, groups of students visit major Jewish geriatric facilities in Baltimore to bring cheer to the elderly residents .

Rosh HaYeshiva's Fund: Students participate in a major annual charity drive, collecting funds that are distributed to needy people both locally and in Israel .

Campus Canteen - The on-campus canteen is an independently operated business that provides food and drinks for students in the evening. It is located in the basement of the Schottenstein/Kolker High School dormitory. It is open from 9:00 PM to 11:00 PM and serves a variety of hot food and drinks, catering to student tastes.

FOOD SERVICES

Ner Israel Rabbinical College is committed to providing students with plentiful, tasteful, and healthy meals in a comfortable and communal environment. All food services are managed from the recently renovated and expanded Rosenberg/Klein Family Dining Facility.

Meal Schedule

College-Level Examination Program (CLEP)[®] Testing: We facilitate the administration of CLEP exams for students who wish to earn college credit through prior knowledge, as detailed in the course listings of this catalog. The college maintains a dedicated and properly equipped room for this purpose.

Private Proctoring for Online Courses: Upon request, the college can provide private proctoring services for students who require a proctor for exams in external online courses, such as those taken to fulfill prerequisites for graduate school.

For more extensive testing needs, students have independently utilized the comprehensive testing centers at other institutions. Many have found success with the services offered by Touro University Worldwide, with whom we have an articulation agreement, and the nearby Community College of Baltimore County (CCBC).

COURSE LISTING

The course numbering system uses a two-character alpha code to describe the discipline the course comes from. The hundreds place digit will imply the level of the student, while the last two digits will link the course to a specific topic. Not all courses are offered every semester.

The time-honored method of study of the Talmud is one where the most advanced experts and the beginners all focus on the same material and their understanding of it. Ner Israel's faculty follows this time-honored method and therefore provided the following system for the Talmud Intensive courses. In the fall and spring semester each course is worth 4 credits (the TD courses). The minimum number of "blatt" (pages in Talmud) to be covered in each semester is 5. This evaluation of credits reflects the perseverance required to focus on the broad range of topics that are covered over these two semesters. Very often some of the study topics in the fall semester are further analyzed in the Spring, requiring additional efforts from the student. The most difficult topics are generally covered in the fall and spring semesters. In the summer the courses are worth 3 credits (the TS courses). The minimum number of "blatt" (pages in Talmud) to be covered in a summer semester is 4. Although the focus of learning is similar in the summer, the timeframe that allows for analytical development is shorter. In addition, a different growth opportunity exists as the student can achieve a certain personal growth by his attention to his studies, even though a majority of the academic world is on vacation.

Courses listed with an asterisk are not offered every semester.

The skills gained are that the student will learn to focus on the text and commentaries printed on the page. ET420* Seminar On Jewish Ethics**Credits: 3****Prerequisite: ET3XX**

Weekly shmuess--a structural dissertation on the classic sources of philosophy and ethics that form the Jewish weltanschauung. An analysis of the nature of man, his duties and responsibilities to his Creator and to his fellow man. The course objectives include: Demonstrate an understanding of the weekly Torah portion as a source for philosophy and ethics; Apply a basic understanding to the responsibilities a man has to his creator; Ability to explore and evaluate the weekly Torah portion. ET470* Seminar in Meidcal Ethics**Credits: 3****Prerequisite: ET3XX**

A research-based project building off of the skills and materials learned in ET370. Each student submits a paper and presents on a specific ethical issue or set of issues facing modern practitioners. Students will develop an approach based on traditional Jewish sources in both halacha and philosophy. Course outcomes include: Demonstrate the ability to analyze source material and apply outcomes to modern medicine; Identify and research one to several current ethical considerations in medicine, and apply traditional Jewish sources to develop an approach; Write a formal paper; Present the project orally.

ED410* Reb Shlomo on Education

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

research-based project based on the educational methods and practices implemented by Rabbi Shlomo Freifeld, as is detailed in the book Reb Shlomo - The Life and Legacy of Rabbi Shlomo Freifeld. Students will be required to submit a research paper discussing the unique educational style and specific methods related therein, and their levels of success in instructing students who can be classified as educationally at-risk.

HI201* Jewish History I

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

Abraham and the rise of monotheism; the Jews and the Egyptian culture; Canaan's conquest; and the Davidic dynasty. The second half of the course focuses on the position of Babylonia, Persia, Greece, and Rome as world leaders, and the socio-religious ramifications of their domination.

HI203* Jewish History II

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

Rome and Western Civilization; The Jewish Response; The codification of Oral Law; The Mishnah and Rabbi Judah the Prince; Autonomy in Babylonia and the Development of the Talmud

HI301* Jewish History III

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

The Gaonic Period, the Ascent of Islam; Maimonides and the Rationalist Debate: Spanish Culture and the Jews - a study in assimilation and exile, Religious anti-Semitism; The ascent of the Aristotelian Paradigm and the Jewish response; The Renaissance.

HI303* Jewish History IV

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

The Ghetto; The renaissance and the Sforno; Chassidism and the Mussar movement; The land of Israel during the exile until the present day.

JU103* Laws Of Daily Rituals

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

A course covering the details as well as the significance of the laws of Blessings, Prayer, Phylacteries, and other portions of the Daily Rituals.

JU203* Laws Of The Sabbath

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

The laws pertaining to the Jewish Sabbath will be studied in the manner outlined in JU103

LA201* Intermediate Hebrew Grammar

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

Course covers basic elements of Hebrew grammar. Students learn to differentiate between binyan kal, pi'el, pu'al, niph'al, and others. Attention is paid to composition of proper sentence structure with appropriate verb forms.

LA202* Intermediate Hebrew Composition

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

Course aims to teach the basic elements of clear Hebrew prose. Attention is paid to technical rules of grammar and sentence structure, as well as to more general stylistic considerations.

LA221* Introductory Aramaic

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

An elementary course in the grammar of Aramaic, with particular reference to its use in the Talmud.

LA222* Intermediate Aramaic

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

Selections from classical texts, with continued study of elements of Aramaic grammar.

LA301* Advanced Hebrew Grammar

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: LA2XX

Regular verb conjugations of passive-intensive, reflexive-intensive and causative forms. Hebrew expository writing.

LA302* Advanced Hebrew Composition

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: LA2XX

Course focuses on more advanced elements of style. Students are encouraged to submit well-written scholarly material for publication in the school journal.

LA310* Hebrew Literature

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: LA2XX

Surveys responsa in Hebrew literature, selecting representative pieces from nearly two millennia of Jewish thought. Students are exposed to the varied styles of different authors as they peruse such diverse works as Maimonides's 11th century Letter to Teiman, Noda B'Yehuda's 18th century condemnation of hunting and Chazon Ish's 20th century discussion of a Halachically binding international dateline.

LA401* Workshop In Hebrew

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: LA3XX

Discussions, essays and reading--all in Hebrew.

LA410* Readings In Modern Heb Lit

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: LA3XX

This course examines a sampling of Hebrew literature produced during the last century. Special attention is paid to the Chazon Ish's classic "Emunah U'Bitachon" - a work of exceeding literary grace.

PE101* Physical Education-1

Credits: 2

Prerequisite: None

Introduction to and training for a personal fitness program for Yeshiva students emphasizing cardiovascular conditioning, conditioning of the major muscle groups and muscular flexibility. The purpose of the course is to demonstrate the benefits and ease of making a regular fitness program part of a Yeshiva student's daily regime.

PE102* Physical Education-2

Credits: 2

Prerequisite: None

Introduction to and training for a personal fitness program for Yeshiva students emphasizing cardiovascular conditioning, conditioning of the major muscle groups and muscular flexibility. The purpose of the course is to demonstrate the benefits and ease of making a regular fitness program part of a Yeshiva student's daily regime.

PH201* Jewish Theology

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

An introduction to and overview of the basic concepts and tenets of the Jewish faith: including Divine revelation; reward and punishment; the role of the Jew in the world; the unique character of the land of Israel.

PH202* Advanced Jewish Theology

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

A more advanced and subtle examination of Jewish fundamentals, including Maimonides's Thirteen Principles of Faith; G-d and the existence of evil; free will.

PH203* Introduction To Jewish Philosophy

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

Covers in a source-oriented way some of the fundamental issues of Jewish philosophy, including the problem of evil, the purpose of creation, and the unique role of mankind in bringing that purpose to fruition. The course will also cover the history of philosophical study in the Jewish tradition and the various attacks it has undergone.

PH301* The Philosophy Of Nachmanides

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: None

The philosophical implications of Nachmanides's writings as well as those portions of his writing which are directly philosophical in method will be studied.

PH308* Advanced Philosophy **Credits: 3**

Prerequisite: PH301

Compares and contrasts some of the great classic philosophers through the ages.

PH404* The Philosophy Of Luzzato **Credits: 3**

Prerequisite: PH301

The life and work of R' Moshe Chaim Luzzatto is the basis of this course. His works on philosophy will provide the main texts, but passages of his mystical works will also be studied.

PR402* Synagogue Administration **Credits: 3**

Prerequisite: S0310

This course is designed to acquaint the student with the problems of organizing and administrating synagogue activities. A full discussion of financial problems of the synagogue is also undertaken.

SC101* Intro To Solar Chronometry **Credits: 3**

Prerequisite: None

A non-laboratory course which provides an introduction to the discipline of astronomy as it impinges upon areas of Jewish law. Areas covered include : The earth's elliptical orbit around the sun and its relationship with the lunar orbit: Eclipses, why and when they occur: The solar system, Milky Way, other stars and constellations: Lunar and space exploration and how Jewish Law deals with the absence of "standard time".

SC101L* Intro To Solar Chronometry -Lab **Credits: 1**

Prerequisite: None

The Lab that accompanies the above course

S0203* Understanding Todays Society **Credits: 3**

Prerequisite: None

A survey of Jewish perspectives on Western social innovations through the works of contemporary and classic Jewish thinkers. Selected readings include writings of R' Dessler, R' Wolbe and others.

S0204* Individual And Society **Credits: 3**

Prerequisite: S0203

A study of the interrelationship of the individual and his social and cultural environment.

SO302* The Family

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: SO203

Structure and functions of the family; relationship with other social groups, its place in contemporary American society.

SO310* Perspective On Marriage

Credits: 3

Prerequisite: ET3XX

The course focuses primarily upon the study of the classic work Ish U'Beito, in its original Hebrew. While close analytical investigation remains an important component, the course generally suspends the usual detached approach to sociological study in favor of a more practical one. Supplemental readings provide further elaboration of prevailing themes.
